News Updates

The autumn has been a busy time for u3a in Kennet with our Annual General Meeting, Kennet Talk and Coffee Exchange sessions, along with our u3a Open Day event which was postponed to 9th November due to the timing clash with the state funeral on 19th September 2022. Thank you to all members of u3a in Kennet who have supported these events. Your help is invaluable in sustaining our varied programme of activities.

We have a new Chair now after our AGM as Jill Turner was elected to replace David Hammond after the completion of his three year term of office. Jill had been the Vice Chair and Jeff Hide was elected into this role in addition to his responsibilities as Groups Coordinator and organising our events.

October / November Coffee Exchanges:

The "October" session took place on the 2nd November and was our first at the Town Hall. The room on the ground floor proved to be excellent as a replacement for the Wesley Hall. It is larger and allows space for more members and potential members to take part. 60 plus members / potential members attended.

Sophia Bentley, a volunteer floor guide at Salisbury Cathedral gave an illustrated talk describing many aspects of the history and interesting features of the beautiful and historic building. Sophia traced the history of the cathedral from the original site in Old Sarum, the granting of papal permission in 1218 and the laying of the first stone in 1220. She outlined many fascinating features of the



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building with its 4 foot foundations on gravel beds, the roof containing 2,800 tons of wood, the high quality sculpture and of course the 40 foot spire: the tallest in Britain. The cathedral has the oldest working clock in the world, the largest cathedral close and cloister in Britain, a copy of the original Magna Carta and the largest working font in Britain. Subsequent changes were made to the building notably during the Civil War in the 17th century and later by Christopher Wren, James Wyatt and Gilbert Scott and latterly various eco-friendly developments such as the installation of solar panels. The talk this month will be by Eileen Hill, a member of our Local History Group, and is about "the Wansdyke". It takes place on Thursday 24th November, again at the Town Hall. Eileen says: 'Many of us will be familiar with the distinctive feature of the Wiltshire





virtual 'Walk along Wansdyke' and refer to the work that has been done by historians and archaeologists to understand its significance. A poster for the event is included at the end of the Newsletter.

Annual General Meeting and Kennet u3a Talk: Our second hybrid AGM and Kennet Talk was held on 26th October 2022 with eighty-five members at Kennet Valley Hall, a further twenty-one on zoom and nineteen apologies for absence with proxy votes. David Hammond presented the Trustees' report and the accounts for the year 2021-22. In addition he shared his reflections on completing his three-year term of office as Chairman spanning the Covid-19 pandemic and its associated challenges with national lockdowns and social distancing which limited our u3a activities. We said 'thank you' and good wishes to David who had joined the Executive Committee originally in 2014. Despite the difficulties



associated with the pandemic David continued to lead us tirelessly and energetically as we adapted to using new technologies and our overall membership numbers are increasing once again now.

We also said 'good bye' to Jan Lillywhite who completed her term of office as our Social Secretary providing the refreshments for our Coffee Exchange sessions, our Kennet Talks and the new members' lunches. Jan had joined the Executive Committee in 2016 and we offer them both our grateful thanks and appreciation for their contributions and wish them all the best for the future.

Other committee changes included the elections of Jill Turner as Chair, Jeff Hide as Vice Chair and four new committee members: Jill Chambers, Alison Dewar, Geneviève Mapson and Georgie Neville. The committee now has eleven members following the untimely death of Tom Horwitz after his reelection. The committee will continue to support the functioning and further development of u3a in Kennet. Following our Annual General Meeting Sibella Laing presented a fascinating Kennet u3a Talk on 'The Power behind the Veil'. Sibella and her husband Stuart, formerly a British Diplomat, had spent many decades in the Middle East living in Saudi Arabia, Oman and Brunei, and Kuwait and her insights into life for women



was particularly timely noting the recent protests in Iran. Sibella outlined the major social, cultural and economic changes in Saudi and the tensions between western influences and traditional Islamic practices as they developed over the years following the 1970ties oil boom. Particular examples included the increasing access to education for girls and women noting for example that while the use of CCTV enables females to study with male tutors, gender segregation persists too. The recent imprisonment without trial of some women for driving was highlighted along with some loosening of restrictions and religious practices

resulting in the adoption of brightly coloured abayas, more women working and studying and generally living independently of male permission. Nevertheless women need permission to marry although women cannot be disinherited and freedom of speech is not permitted. The Talk ended on a positive note with several examples of high profile women as CEOs of major companies and scientists. Special Interest Day: The subject will still be "*The Future of the Media"*. More information is to follow once plans are confirmed. We will let you know the new date as soon as we can.

Day Trip Group: In order to brighten up a gloomy month, the Day Trip Group is going to South Kensington on Friday 24th February 2023. The cost will be £18 per person. South Kensington offers several indoor venues. The coach will drop us off at the Natural History Museum in Cromwell Road. The Science Museum and the Victoria and Albert Museum are a few minutes' walk away. Apart from ticketed exhibitions, all museum collections are free.

Natural History Museum: ticketed exhibitions include *Wildlife Photographer of the Year.* (£13.50 prebook online)

Science Museum: includes five Wellcome Foundation galleries (opened in 2019) housing some of the most significant medical collections in the world with over 3000 medical artefacts.

Victoria and Albert Museum has 7000 miles of exhibits. Refreshment can be taken in the Gamble, Morris and Poynter rooms – the World's first museum café built in 1868 and lavishly decorated with majolica tiles. The V&A is hosting several interesting ticketed exhibitions in February including Donatello's *Sculpting the Renaissance*. (£20 pre-book online)

Should museums not be your thing, Harrods is a 10-minute walk away, the Brompton Oratory is a 5-minute walk or Kensington Palace a 20 minutes' walk from the coach drop-off point. The estimated time available in West Kensington is four and a half hours. The Science Museum (<u>sciencemuseum.org.uk</u>) requests that you book your free museum entry tickets online. There is no need to do this for the V&A or Natural History Museums.



Tom Horwitz: We are deeply saddened by the sudden and untimely passing of Tom Horwitz: a member of the Executive Committee and our website manager. Tom died at the end of the week in which we held our successful 30th birthday and Open Day celebrations where he had arranged the technical support for the event. Tom and his wife Lynne joined u3a in Kennet in 2017. He was elected to the committee in 2019 and re-elected for a further 3-year term just last month at our 2022 AGM. He was a member of several groups including American History, Backgammon, Bridge and two Controversial Discussion Groups., Quizzing and Science, Technology, Engineering & Maths. We will miss his friendship and positive approach, his clarity of thought, his humour and of course his technical expertise.



Jim Kelly: Jim, who was a member of the Digital Photography Group, recently passed away. This was on the 17th October. He was aged 65 years and died at Great Western Hospital. Some weeks earlier he had a fall while at a wedding in Scotland, but was able to return home. His health soon deteriorated and following



a second hospital admission he became seriously ill. His wife Lynne and their daughter Marie are both shocked & devastated. A proud and typical Glaswegian, Jim and his family moved to Wiltshire 36 years ago with his employment. He was a sales director with IBM for over 26 years, before taking early retirement for health reasons. Jim joined u3a in Kennet in July 2017 and was one of the original members of the newly formed Controversial Discussion Group, which first met in March 2018. He will be remembered as a devoted family man, who was always interesting with his unique ideas and thoughts, and for his sense of humour, smile and contributions to the group. Recently Jim joined the Digital Photography Group but only had the chance to attend one meeting.

The Medlar (from Allan Skipper, member of Flora and Fauna Group**):** At the rear door to Waitrose in Marlborough there are a number of trees. One of these is a Medlar. Once cultivated by the Greeks and the

Romans thousands of years ago it was found in old cottage gardens, orchards and parks here. It is a native of SE Asia and SE Europe. Built on the site of a cinema Waitrose opened in 1977. The tree could then be around 35 years old. Medlars belong to the Rose family. The Dog rose, crab apples, hawthorn, mountain ash, blackthorn, cherry and plum trees are also members of this family. Medlar are small trees with grey bark and crooked trunks. The white flowers have five petals and are pollinated by bees.





The fruit is gathered in October and BLETTED. This means it is allowed to go over- ripe to become brown and soft. When eaten out of its skin with a teaspoon it tastes like "baked apple with the consistency of chestnut purée." So it is claimed! Jellies and preserves can be made when Medlar is baked; it was used in tanning because of its high tannin content, Medlar tea and medlar cheese are other uses. The cheese is really a cake. There are on line recipes for this if interested. It also has antibacterial properties. The five seeds in each

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
fruit are dispersed by birds. The dark dots if the photo are some of the seeds. Chaucer called the medlar "an opened arsed fruit ". Allan is plucking up the courage to sample the fruit but is still waiting for the bletting to end.


