## **Speaker Biographies**

**David Hammond** is Chairman of the u3a Bath & Wiltshire Network. He was previously the Chairman of u3a in Kennet from 2019 – 2022. He takes a keen interest in all its groups and activities, including as an active participant in the Controversial Current Affairs discussion group.

**Naomi Kerbel** is an expert in many forms of communication and is Communications Director with media advisers, SEC Newgate. She has 12 years' broadcast experience as a TV journalist at Bloomberg, Sky News and CNBC. Naomi is an advocate for social justice, access and equality through her podcast 'Show me the Way' (which profiles women making a difference to lives of others); as a judge for the Veuve Clicquot BOLD awards; as an ambassador for Asia Women of Achievement Awards; and as a founding advisor for OK Mentor.

**Dominic Ponsford** is the editor in chief of Press Gazette and has more than 20 years' experience in journalism. He is a former Paul Foot Awards finalist and Professional Publishers Association (PPA) Editor of the Year nominee 2022.





**Tom Newton Dunn** began his career at the Daily Telegraph and subsequently had long spells as a "red top" news journalist with both the Mirror and Sun. After 10 years writing about defence (including 9/11 and wars in Afghanistan and Iraq) he turned to politics and to new roles in broadcast journalism. He became a presenter and chief political commentator at the newly formed *Times Radio* and then moved to *TalkTV* ahead of its launch in April 2022. There he presents the hour-long flagship weekday news programme, *First Edition*. His press awards include Scoop of the Year and Politics Journalism.



Karen Gardner is a broadcast, social media and on-line journalist with BBC Radio Wiltshire. She was first on the scene and led their 2018 coverage of the Novichok attack in Salisbury. Other notable stories include Swindon murderer Keith Halliwell's conviction; the Stonehenge tunnel saga; closure of Swindon's Honda Factory and the army's rebasing to Salisbury Plain. She has also worked for the Daily Telegraph, online news sites and women's magazines. She joined the BBC in 2009 and works as a social media journalist and radio presenter – locally and nationally – and trains and mentors new journalists.

**Nigel Farndale** has won several journalism awards. He was chief interviewer on The Sunday Telegraph for 20 years. His interview subjects have included Sir Mick Jagger, Stephen Hawking, Donald Trump and Sir Paul McCartney. Currently a senior editor at The Times, he has also written for the Observer, Financial Times, Daily Telegraph and Spectator. Nigel's several books include The Blasphemer, a bestselling novel that was shortlisted for the Costa Prize.
