News Updates

We will have several vacancies on the Committee following our AGM as some Trustees will be standing down after completing their terms of office. Coffee Exchange: Marianna Baschiera from the Greatwood Charity, based at Clench Common, came to talk to us at the Coffee Exchange in July on how racehorses help to change lives and create futures. Marianna has a masters degree in teaching mindfulness based programmes which has helped her develop the well-being provision at Greatwood. The Charity was established to help former racehorses find a new home and a job outside racing. During the rehabilitation process, it was discovered that the animals could help both children and adults during difficult times. Marianna told several stories about individuals who have benefitted from regular visits to the stables - people with physical or mental problems who found strength from their contact with the horses. Some young people have taken their interest forward and are now employed within the racing industry. Marianna also mentioned that for those who were overpowered by the size of the horses, they keep goats and even chickens to help by providing the physical contact which is so important in the therapy. The audience was fascinated by the stories and moved by the success of the therapy. The charity is doing amazing work for individuals and several of our members put forward ideas on how they could publicise they work more widely.

The next Coffee Exchange session will be on Thursday 31st August upstairs in the Assembly Room at Marlborough Town Hall. Doors open at 10.15am and coffee, tea and biscuits will be available. Our speaker will be u3a in Kennet member Tony Globe who will update us on the establishment of the new Family History Group. In recent years there's been a rapidly growing interest in researching family histories, prompted in part by programmes such as "Who Do You Think You Are?" and "Long Lost Family". At the same time technology is making more and more information accessible online. Tony Globe, Leader of the Family History Group, will show us what is available today and how it can help us to build our own family history. Tony will be using examples based on his research into his own family, and there may be some surprises in store...! If you are interested in delving into your own family's past, bring paper and pen to make notes. We plan to record the talk so that those unable to attend are able to "catch up" later via our web page.

Kennet u3a Talk: The July talk Dams and the World Water Problem was by one of our own members, Jonathan Hinks. The title of the talk excited much interest even before the event. A reliable source of water must be one of the most important issues facing the world. Certainly Jonathan's talk gave us plenty of information on how dams are helping to solve the problem. His talk ranged over the increase in the size of world population, the history of dams and the varied uses of dams including irrigation, hydropower, water supply, flood control, and navigation. His vast experience in the field was obvious from the detailed and interesting stories of the construction of various dams. Jonathan has worked in over 18 different countries designing and advising on dam construction. His talk was peppered with amusing anecdotes of his personal experiences and illustrated with 49 slides. We are extremely fortunate to have such a distinguished expert among our members and we are very grateful for his stimulating talk delivered with his wry sense of humour. During his talk Jonathan referred to his particular interest in earthquakes and reservoirs. If anyone is interested in his further paper on this subject, it is available on the u3a in Kennet website. After the Covid lockdowns, tennis rapidly became one of the nation's favourite sports – not only is it largely socially distanced but it is a great way to exercise gently in the fresh air. So how about forming a u3a tennis group? Tennis is a game for all ages and Marlborough Tennis has a healthy proportion of its members of a similar age profile to u3a, so it goes to show you are never too young or old to pick up a tennis racket.



Ability need not be a barrier either with the club having a range of players, from new starters to rusty rackets to good league standard players. More important is your desire to have fun and enjoy the sport. We find many tennis players played tennis in their youth and then work, families and more got in the way and only when retirement came along did tennis feature on the agenda once more. Marlborough Tennis is

situated at the top of Port Hill, with the same entrance as the Golf Club. The club has six courts and invites u3a in Kennet to make use of these fabulous facilities by establishing a tennis group. The club can make either one or two courts available for a nominal charge of £10 per court per hour so for a doubles match, that is just £2.50 per hour each which is remarkable value. History Group and Current Affairs Groups: Michael Hart is standing down as Group Leader for both the History and Current Affairs groups. After more than 15 years of leading the u3a in Kennet English and European History and the Current Affairs Groups Michael Hart has stepped down at the age of 95. Following an impressive career in education as a history teacher, headmaster of schools in the UK and overseas (International schools in Brussels and Luxembourg) and then a school inspector, Michael was awarded the CBE. He moved into Marlborough in 2006 and soon joined u3a in Kennet taking on the leadership of the European and subsequently the English History Groups. Many members of the History Groups joined at that time and have benefitted enormously from Michael's extensive knowledge, dedication and enthusiasm for the subject. He is widely respected in the Groups for his candid, balanced and concise lectures, his kindness & humanity and his wider approach as a European. His strong sense of fairness sees clearly the necessity for future diplomatic rapprochement in the interests of peace, trade and culture. Having lived through and loathed the rise of Nazism as a schoolboy in Germany Michael is chary of the disruptions of populist movements and believes NATO is essential to collective European Defence. He has argued constantly for peace, for justice and a free unbiased rule of law, a free press and accountable governance. He advocates the intrinsic dignity of nations seeking stable and collaborative, working solutions to world problems and the protection and betterment of their peoples. In addition to his role as a Group Leader Michael also supported u3a in Kennet as a member of the Executive Committee from 2007-2009 in the role of the Charity Commission contact.

Ian Keel: Ian died in July aged 89. He was a long-time keen member of the Birdwatching Group, on the committee of the former Travel Group and, with his wife Juliet, ran the Thursday Coffee Club for many years.

The Meadow Brown Butterfly: An article sent to us by Allan Skipper This butterfly is one of our most common. In this year's Big Butterfly Count it comes second to the Red Admiral with just a few more days to the end of the count. Other names for it are Brown Meadow Eyed, Golden Meadow Eyed and a Meadow Brown Argos; the eyes referring to the wing spots. Lepidopterists refer to this butterfly as one of the browns. In this country there are eleven species of brown butterfly including the Small Heath, the Ringlet and even the Marbled White ... clearly not a brown butterfly. Eggs are laid from July to October and the caterpillar grows from October to May. These larvae feed on grasses and turn greener as they shed their skin six times during growth. The larvae then pupate for three to



four weeks before emerging as adults from July to September. The wings of the Meadow Brown feature in "The garden of Earthly Delights" by Hieronymus Bosch. A demon is wearing the butterfly's wings and having a word with a sinner ... saying possibly "You are doomed". If you can find these wings in the painting please let Allan know where to look. He has tried.
