

Coffee Exchange: Tony Globe, the History group, gave us a fascinating Coffee Exchange. The intriguing title adopted at a few weeks old and so his were for him a truly revealing with the twists and turns of the story the streets of London. - 1. Work backwards in time: It's easier to work methodically from a fact such as the date of birth or a marriage of a relative than to try and trace down from a person you don't know much about.
- 2. Ask the family: Ask other relatives what they remember about their families. Make a note of any nicknames or name changes. Ask them to tell you any family stories, what their ancestors did for a living, or what they looked like. Ask if they have any photos, letters or documents relating to your ancestors.
- 3. Take notes: You never know what information will prove useful in your research so get into the habit of taking notes on what you have looked for and what you found. There are many useful computer software packages that will help you keep your records in an orderly manner and help draw up pedigrees and family groups sheets, so you know who you are dealing with.
- 4. Check out the Web: The Internet can be a useful tool for contacting relatives and finding data. The Society of Genealogists website has a lot of information to get you started. Additionally, the GENUKI website has lots of free information and links to local experts and sources for the United Kingdom and Ireland. Of course, many records themselves are now online at such sites as: Ancestry, Find My Past, The Genealogist or My Heritage.
- 5. Meet other family historians: Family Historians are an incredible help to each other. There is a network of local societies with regular meetings up and down the country. Here you can meet likeminded people with the same interests and local expertise. The Society of Genealogists prelive.sog.org.uk is the largest genealogical society with a remarkable library and education programme. Details of local societies can be found through the Federation of Family History Societies www.ffhs.org.uk.

u3a Open Day: There is a Latin phrase, Omne trium perfectum, which suggests that things that come in threes are perfect or complete. We often remember three bad things that happen and the three good things remain a distant memory. Not so last Wednesday when the third u3a in Kennet Open Day took place. Our Open Days started in the middle of Covid and were then curtailed legally. Last year was very good and this time, again, it all went well thanks mainly to the enthusiasm, energy and determination of all those who supported their groups and helped to organise. Not least was the Really Useful Group led by Alision Dewar, which provided much needed and appreciated light refreshments all day from about 9am through to 3pm. This Group is indeed Really Useful! The Mayor of Marlborough, Councillor Nick Fogg M.B.E. formally opened the event with a short speech after being introduced by Town Crier Mike Tupman full of his usual good humour, ad lib jokes and much gravitas. This year we had the pleasure of hearing our Recorder Ensembles playing live as well as seeing an electric cycle and a table tennis



table that automatically fired balls towards volunteer players. The odd ball even found itself reaching display boards. The video film showing our groups, some in action was shown throughout the Day. It was compiled by Committee members Hamzah who provides our technical support, and was seen by about two hundred people who were present during the day. All our groups were represented by posters on display boards set on tables and our membership secretary, Mike Morison, welcomed 24 new members. Our National u3a Office has been informed our celebrations with interest. Well done all who attended and thank you.

Kennet u3a Talk: This will be held on 25th October to follow the AGM which starts at 2.15pm at Kennet Valley Hall, Lockeridge. It is called Great Musical Moments and will be presented by Robin Nelson, former Head of Music at Marlborough College, currently Musical Director of the Swindon Choral Society, a composer and renowned as an ornithologist. We have all wondered what eight records we would take if we ever appeared on Desert Island Discs: a song which triggers a personal memory, a work that can bring solace to the lonely soul, a passage which encapsulates a mood or feeling that words cannot express..... Robin takes the exercise a stage further, in trying to pinpoint the exact moment in a wonderful piece of music that really gets you—the final top note in "Nessun dorma" perhaps, or the ringing cries of the three Rhinemaidens:—"Rhinegold, Rhinegold!"— In the opening scene of Wagner's epic Ring Cycle. From Bach to Britten, Handel to Strauss, eleven inspirational passages are considered and their special merits highlighted in sound and score extracts.

Storage facilities: Your u3a has various items of equipment to support our meetings: poster display boards, our feather flag and the banners which we used at our Open Day, projector stand etc. At present these items are stored by Committee members in their homes and garages and taken to events as necessary. Ideally the items would be kept together in one place near to where they are needed: principally in Marlborough. Can you help? We need clean, dry and secure site (or sites) and we would arrange to collect the items and return them after use at our events. Ideally we do not want to
